The battle took place between the armies of King Harold of Wessex and William of Normandy (later known as William the Conqueror).

The Battle of Hastings - HISTORY

Account of the Battle of Hastings: William, Duke of Normandy, launched his bloody and decisive invasion of Saxon England in 1066. In that year Edward the Confessor, King of England, died without heir, appointing by his will Harold Godwinsson, son of England’s most powerful nobleman, the Earl of Wessex, as his successor.

The Battle of Hastings took place at the site now known as Battle on 14 October 1066, and is one of the best known events in England’s history.. King Harold drew up his army in three sections on Senlac Ridge, overlooking the battlefield. With him he had up to 5,000 weary men, ranged against William Duke of Normandy and a Norman force of many more thousands of infantry, archers and cavalry.

Possibly the most significant battle in English history, Hastings was the third battle fought in rapid succession by Harold Godwinson, last Saxon King of England. Marching his troops south from York he sought to surprise and destroy the forces of William, Duke of Normandy who had landed at Pevensey and already established his first castle at Hastings.

The Battle of Hastings began at dawn on October 14, 1066, when William’s army moved toward Harold’s army, which was occupying a ridge 10 miles (16 km) northwest of Hastings. As the day progressed, the defense was worn down and slowly outnumbered. According to the Bayeux Tapestry, Harold was killed late in the afternoon.
