Anticoagulation medications are high-risk drugs.¹ There is a very small window for therapeutic dosing: too much of a drug can cause bleeding, and too little may lead to clotting. How to administer inotropic drugs - RCNi

Nursing Implications: Check blood pressure and pulse before each administration of NTG—blood pressure can drop precipitously after a single dose. Hold dose if systolic BP < 90 mm Hg or more than 30 mm Hg below baseline.

Giving cardiovascular drugs safely : Robinson, Jean : Free ...

Drugs with a pH below 5, including vancomycin, shouldn't be infused through a peripheral vein,

according to current Infusion Nurses Society standards of practice. However, collaborating with the prescriber and pharmacist, you can safely infuse higher concentrations (10 to 20 mg/ml) of vancomycin through central venous catheters (CVCs).
