Like palliative care, hospice provides comprehensive comfort care as well as support for the family, but, in hospice, attempts to cure the person's illness are stopped. Hospice is provided for a person with a terminal illness whose doctor believes he or she has 6 months or less to live if the illness runs its natural course.

Hospice care is offered and provided for patients during their last phase of an incurable illness or near the end of life, such as in some people with advanced or metastatic cancer. Palliative care can be offered and provided at any stage of a serious illness.

Hospice care provides comprehensive physical, psychological, social, and spiritual care for terminally ill patients. Most hospice programs serve terminally ill patients from the comforts and relaxed surroundings of their own home, although there are some located in inpatient settings. In order to qualify for hospice care, the patient's doctor, and often a hospice doctor as well, must determine that the patient is terminally ill, with a life expectancy of six months or less; the decision to treat someone at a higher level of care falls to the hospice physician.

Your hospice doctor and your regular doctor (if you have one) certify that you're terminally ill (with a life expectancy of 6 months or less). You accept palliative care (for comfort) instead of care to cure your illness.

Prioritize your care based on patient needs and wishes and incorporate the hospice mission statement. Each organization has its own mission statement, but all emphasize comfort over cure. Don't compare patients in hospice with other patients, and don't provide care based on your experience with patients who had similar diagnoses.

Hospice services will not be denied to a patient who already has a feeding tube in place. The hospice team will work closely with the patient, family and caregiver to decide whether to continue to use the tube. While a feeding tube technically can be removed, most often the decision is made to just stop using it.

When a Hospice Patient Stops Eating or Drinking

Hospice is an integral component of care for patients with advanced illness.
