PEER OBSERVATION OF TEACHING

Additionally, teachers must communicate well to effectively collaborate with colleagues and update administrators on student progress.

Why Is It Important for Teachers to Have Good ...

Use data from tests to supplement your observation. Watch the process children go through to master skills, concepts, or content. Ask students to think aloud for you so you can probe their understanding of content and strategies. Build student portfolios to record performance benchmarks during the year.
