Paradise Lost: A Shift in Narrative Language After the Fall. Rendition of Satan's attack against God in Milton's Paradise Lost (1667) Once Eve eats the apple from the tree of knowledge, the Fall is immediately evoked. Yet, the most apparent signifier of this change is the transformation of language between Adam and Eve.

Formally, Paradise Lost contains many classical and Renaissance epic conceits: it begins in medias res; it concerns heavenly and earthly beings and the interactions between them; it uses conventions such as epic similes, catalogues of people and places, and invocations to a muse; and it contains themes common to epics, such as war, nationalism, empire, and stories of origin.

By "rhetoricity" or "rhetoric," de Man means "tropes and figures" (Allegories of Reading 6). In Milton's Paradise Lost, "tropes and figures" appear not only in the diabolic rhetoric but also in the utterances of good angels, the unfallen Adam and Eve, the Son and God.
