Also, responding to behaviors with criticism or yelling adversely affects children's self-esteem. Delayed consequences: The most effective consequences are immediate. Every moment that passes after a behavior, your child is less likely to link her behavior to the consequence.

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Responding to Bad Behavior - Changing minds

In a problem situation, make time to identify what you feel and need from this person. Identify what outcome you want from responding - e.g. your partner agreeing to change their problem behavior.

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Then ask if s/he is open to some feedback about his/her behavior.
